President's Report

On behalf of the Board, I would like to acknowledge that the LCSA, through its members and communities, work and operate on Aboriginal lands throughout NSW and we would like to acknowledge the traditional custodians and their continuing connection to land, waters and culture. We pay our respects to their Elders past, present and emerging.

This year has seen us continuing with the funding reform process through our funder FACS (now Communities and Justice). Those services selecting Pathway One under the Targeted Early Intervention are working towards the completion of their activity mapping and program logics. Acknowledgement is given that this is progressing at differing levels across the State and is a learning process for members. Also, as we move towards June 2020, services are awaiting the move to commissioning. While, as members we are undergoing reform, it should be noted that all state peak organisations, as well as the LCSA, are being reviewed. Please be assured that the LCSA is engaging on a continual basis with our funder and other relevant bodies to move forward on contractual and other funding arrangements on our members behalf.

As mentioned in last year's report, the LCSA will be hosting the International Federation of Settlements and Neighbourhood Centres' (IFS) Conference in Sydney, which will be held in August 2020. This Conference will be held in place of the annual LCSA Conference and affords members the opportunity to attend an international conference. Working Parties are progressing with the organising of the Conference and you will begin to see more details appear over the next few months. We welcome not only your attendance, but also your participation and contribution, as we ask for members to assist us and when abstracts are called for.

As usual, the LCSA has been involved in so many areas, that within this report, they cannot be all outlined. So, I would like to thank our Funders and Supporters (which are acknowledged further into the Report). Most importantly, I would like to thank the Staff Team at LCSA - Can Yaşmut, Lyn Lormer, Anthony Brown, Asha Hewafonsekage (until January 2019), Damien House (March to July 2019) and Julie Williams - for their contributions to the success of LCSA as the organisation advocating for your interests. The work output and ethic, for a small team, is outstanding.

Finally, special thanks go to those members who served on the LCSA Board throughout this year — Skye Sear (Vice President), Gretchen Young (Secretary), Paul Sekfy (Treasurer), Tairyn Vergara, Michael M. Shreenan and Pam Symonds. Unfortunately, Pam is stepping down from the Board as she is retiring from work and her position at the Parkes Neighbourhood Centre. We thank Pam for her contribution to the LCSA and her community.

I look forward to an exciting 2019-20 and working with the Board, if re-elected, on your behalf.

Executive Officer's Report

LCSA proudly represents around 200 Neighbourhood Centres and other community development organisations across NSW. We advocate on behalf of our members, represent their interests to government and provide them with capacity building and organisational governance support.

Neighbourhood Centres and community development are an essential part of a diverse and capable community services system. In the lead up to the 2019 NSW State Elections we worked closely with our members, the LCSA Regional Representative Council and the LCSA Board to articulate a long-term sustainability policy for Neighbourhood Centres. The key message is that our members form a state-wide network, embedded in community, led by community and trusted by community.

LCSA called on both the government and the opposition to recognise the dual role our Neighbourhood Centres play in NSW

- Neighbourhood Centres are part of social infrastructure, along with other public assets such as libraries and parks; and ought to be better utilised the seize the opportunities afforded by Neighbourhood Centres to engage local communities and deliver government funded services.
- 2) The role of community development in the government funded community service delivery must be strengthened within and beyond FACS portfolio responsibilities in Child Protection (TEI and TFM).

In addition to articulating this important future direction, this year has been a year other 'firsts'. We created the first Aboriginal identified position within LCSA, we held our annual conference in Western Sydney for the first time, we had the first secondment of an LCSA staff member into government and to top it all off, we have commenced the work for the first international neighbourhood centre conference in the southern hemisphere — the IFS 2020 Conference in Sydney. I thank the LCSA Board for their guidance and their support that allowed us as a team to achieve these firsts and to continue serving our members with a view to the future.

I have the greatest respect and gratitude for the LCSA Team for their continued commitment and dedication to our work serving the best interests of our members and our organisation; thank you Team, together with our partners and supporters, we are moving into an exciting year ahead. A special thank you to Nazli Munir who was instrumental in writing the LCSA Policy Position. Finally, I wish to acknowledge our co-tenants Fams and Youth Action, thank you for sharing office space in such a collegial spirit that makes coming to work a joy and that - at the same time - creates synergies and joint efforts between our organisations and constituents.

Sector Development

LCSA is funded by FACS under the Sector Development Program to achieve three outcomes:

- Sector understands FACS intentions concerning future service and program design and the role of neighbourhood and community centres and locally based
- 2. Sector contributes to FACS understanding of the capacity and potential of neighbourhood and community centres, locally based services in its service and program design
- 3. LCSA member organisations are prepared and developed to be able to identify and provide required services within FACS reform framework.

We continued monitoring our performance by asking our members through a quarterly survey on how we are faring. With a steady response rate of 20% of our membership we can show the following results:

77% of members reporting their views were sought by peak on social policy issues affecting the child and family services sector.

94% of members reported they are well informed by peak about broader social policies, and of changes and developments within the sector.

89% of members and/or stakeholders reporting that they are supported by peak to develop capacity in sustainable and effective service delivery to achieve client outcomes

The 2018/19 financial year saw the **Targeted Earlier Intervention (TEI) Reforms** take a different pathway towards implementation. Preparing our members for change took on a different face as Their Futures Matter (TFM) took greater prominence on the reform agenda and DEX was nominated by FACS as the accountability portal for outcomes for TEI service providers.

LCSA members, while welcoming the whole of government approach to child protection being espoused by Their Futures Matter, have struggled to see its immediate relevance to their work to strengthen communities and build resilience especially as inequality has grown and the drought has worsen in rural Australia. For members, it all about who comes in the door seeking assistance and who is willing to be involved in community led projects of relevance to their locality and community.

The majority of members have embraced the Human Services Outcomes Framework and work with the TEI outcomes as a matter of course. The adoption of the DEX platform as the reporting tool has led to more angst because initially it was not seen to embrace community outcomes only individual outcomes and was labour intense with small services lacking capacity to comply.

LCSA has worked hard on its member's behalf to further adapt the DEX to reflect community outcomes as well as helping services with their service mapping and program logics. We wish to acknowledge the work of Fams and CCWT in providing such informative and interesting workshops to the sector and smoothing the way for transition.

LCSA has supported individual organisations with their transition planning by providing webinars, governance training and insight into how they can best negotiate with FACS to represent their community's best interests.

Neighbourhood Centre Week was again held in the first week of May with the theme of "Bringing People Together". Many Neighbourhood Centres promoted their activities by running events, talking to their local politicians and ensuring engagement with residents. LCSA celebrated Neighbourhood Centre Week with a Partner's Breakfast, where Prof. Alan Morris from UTS was the guest speaker on Housing and Loneliness and there was a discussion about reducing the effects of loneliness and the role Neighbourhood Centres could play in these strategies.

We also sought to strengthen our partnerships to reflect the broad activities Neighbourhood Centres undertake. This included working with icare, Office of Emergency Management, Collaboration for Impact, Infoxchange, Services NSW, Settlement Services International, and the Community Migrant Resource Centre.

One of the significant partnerships is with Sydney University and Dr Michelle Villeneuve's research regarding working with people with disabilities in disaster situations. LCSA is a community partner in Michelle's successful bid for an ARC Linkage Grant to further this research.

LCSA has also supported its members by attending significant functions, answering phone calls, sending out Newsletters and attending regional meetings either in person or using platforms such as SKYPE or "gotomeeting". Regional meetings were attended in the New England, Mid North Coast, the Hunter, the Illawarra, Western NSW, the Murrumbidgee, the Inner Sydney/Inner West, South West Sydney, Blacktown/Cumberland/Prospect and Macarthur.

LCSA Connecting Communities Conference 2018

One of the most significant ways LCSA acts to increase the capacity of the Sector is by providing training and inspiration through the Connecting Communities Conference.

The 2018 Conference had just over 180 delegates with the theme 'Local Community Matters'. The Conference was held at the Waterview in Bicentennial Park in Western Sydney and was supported significantly by Parramatta City Council, FACS, icare and HESTA.

This gives a flavour of what people felt about the conference, with positive comments including:

- The LCSA crew did a great job
- Loved it all
- Can't wait for next year
- Loved the Conference Dinner it was very inspiring so glad I went
- It has been eye opening and thought provoking
- The highlight or me was the Multicultural Dinner

Cassandra Goldie, Peter Westoby, Laura Kelly and Paul Schmitz were rated as 'inspiring' with all other speakers 'useful', indicating the level of practical knowledge was high. The panel and table discussions on building community resilience were also seen as useful but too short with not enough time for adequate discussion. The Masterclasses were praised highly by those who attended and were rated as very useful.

The community dinner "A Taste of Diversity" reflected the cultural diversity of Western Sydney, and for those who attended, was highly praised as one of the highlights of the Conference. It also enabled us to partner with

a whole range of services from that area such as Western Sydney Community Forum, the Community Migrant Resource Centre, the City of Parramatta Council, Easy Go Connect, Cumberland Council, and the Sydney Olympic Park Authority. Many of the concurrent sessions were presented by services from Western Sydney including the Marrin Weejali Aboriginal Corporation; the City of Parramatta Council, Woodville Alliance and Nepean Community and Neighbourhood Services, Gateway Family Services to name a few.

Time has been spent starting to plan for the 2020 IFS Conference which will be hosted in Sydney next year. In terms of resources the LCSA continued to update and add to their generic Policy and Procedure Manual.

A range of Conferences were attended throughout the year:

- Their Futures Matter Conference
- ACOSS Conference
- International Metropolis Conference
- Neighbourhood Houses Victoria Conference

These learning experiences have proved to be valuable in terms of keeping up with sector trends in community development and the social services sector.

Website Projects

Towards the end of 2018 LCSA embarked on an ambitious project to migrate our entire online platform to a new and improved, upgraded system. Because our members are at the centre of all the work that we do, it is important that we invest in a web-based software system that provides us with an effective and efficient way to engage and support our members.

On a daily basis, LCSA requires the ability to manage our membership database and billing, curate content for a number of websites and social media, communicate through email marketing tools, handle event registrations and provide analytics and reporting. Our legacy system had become out of date, very limited in what it could do and was no longer user-friendly for LCSA staff to perform regular tasks, or for our members to navigate and find relevant information easily and engage with us.

After the initial migration of our membership data to the new software platform, we spent a considerable amount of time setting up and learning the new system through many hours of training, whilst also working through a series of activities that would ensure we created new website content that met the needs of our members and LCSA.

During the design and development phase of building content for LCSA's new website our focus soon shifted to setting up a website for our Annual Conference as a priority in the early part of 2019, in order to begin promoting and accepting registrations for this key event in LCSA's calendar. Despite a bit of short-term pain and teething problems with the conference website, we were able to successfully create a very professional site that is engaging, informative, user-friendly and is completely integrated with all of our other systems.

We are excited by the potential scope of our new online platform as we take advantage of the many features that will enable LCSA to improve our workflow, communicate more effectively and provide a higher level of support and engagement with our members, partners and other stakeholders.

We look forward to rolling out the new LCSA website at the beginning of the next financial year, along with several other sites to be launched or updated, such as communitydevelopment.org.au

Treasurer's Report

I present the annual financial report for the 2018-2019 financial year for our association with the news that we have operated within our budget, met the negotiated outputs for our funding contracts, and have achieved small surplus for the year. It is important for members to note that we remain an active organisation, with relatively limited staff resources.

LCSA operations attempt to strike a balance between meeting both our funded activities and, more broadly, our Strategic Plan that supports the needs of our members and promotes our collective interests. The Board has supported the continuing upgrade of our website, employment of additional staff and remained on course with our 3-year plan for our conferences. The Board has also continued to use video conferencing as an efficiency measure to great effect. The Board, alongside our Executive Officer, has remained focused on improving the financial position. This has included finalising modifications to our Woolloomooloo meeting room in cooperation with our co-tenants to enable an income stream and provide a technological competent resource for the sector generally. The Board has also addressed various risk scenarios in relation to our funding and have formally undertaken to carry the risk on our 2020 International Conference.

We continue to provide subsidised members rates for the LCSA Conference and Masterclasses and support the Regional Representative Council.

This year's results reflect the Board's and staff's focus on our finances and the work of the Board's finance sub-committee. I am grateful for this effort and assistance.

LCSA received funding from the NSW Family and Community Services under the Sector Development Program and TEI Assistance Project as well as from our local member of parliament Alex Greenwich MP for the technological upgrade of the meeting room. The total funding income from these two sources for the financial year was \$471,719. LCSA generated further income through Membership Fees \$46,864; Annual Conference \$115,353; Fees for Service of \$48,651 and other income including interest earned \$1,180. The total income for the year was \$683,767. LCSA recorded an operating surplus of \$10,492 for the financial year ended 30 June 2019.

LCSA's Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2019 records a sound financial position with a cash balance of \$175,614 and \$113,749 in equity. In accordance with the requirement of the NSW Fair Trading and our funding bodies, the financial statements in this year's annual report have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards. The complete audited financial statements are included in the report and provide a more detailed account of the overall financial position and performance of the LCSA during the financial year ended 30 June 2019.

I wish to thank the LCSA staff (including our bookkeeper) for their continued diligence in relation to finances underpinned by their strong commitment to our strategic plan and our values.
